1 Freshers' Week Highlights

- **Welcome to Oriel Reception:** This is the formal opening of our Freshers' Week, an opportunity to meet with all the new graduate students at Oriel in the College's Dining Hall, which due to refurbishments being carried on will not be used ordinarily during this year. This is a fantastic way of starting your Oriel experience, in our 400 year-old Hall. The reception will consist of alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks and canapés. You will receive an invitation for this event and will need to RSVP in time. **Sunday 6th October, 19:30 in the Hall.**
- **Tour of Oxford:** I will take you around the centre of Oxford, showing some of the most interesting spots, coffee-shops, college sites, libraries, and other interesting things you might struggle to find easily on your own. **Monday 7th October, 14:00-15:00, meet in the Porters' Lodge.**
- College Parents' Dinner: As part of your integration into Oriel, we have assigned each one of you some senior graduate students from a related field, who will be your 'College Parents' and will help you settle in and find your way around town and Oriel. This is the first encounter with your College Parents, as well as with other freshers from similar subjects to yours. Monday 7th October, 18:00-20:30, location to be defined by your College Parents.
- **Meet the Provost:** Lord Neil Mendoza is the Provost ('Master') of Oriel, who leads and represents the College and will receive you formally into it in your admissions ceremony. The Provost, together with his wife Amelia, plays a role in the day-to-day life of Oriel as a family and this is a great opportunity to sit with him in the MCR for a casual chat. I really recommend you take this great opportunity to meet more personally and casually with Neil. **Thursday 10th October, 10:00-11:30 in the MCR main room.**
- Oriel Freshers' Fair: This is the main freshers' event of the week, which combines graduate and undergraduate students in the Hall to learn about the many different societies and clubs around which interests such as debate, politics, music, sports, games, film, theatre, philosophy, reading and many more are organised in College. It is a great way of having all these different groups in one room and be able to ask questions and get to know some of the members to see what you would like to take part in during the year. Wednesday 9th October, 11:00-12:00 in the Hall.
- Chocolate Tasting and Cocktail Making Events: Anna, our lovely Vice-President has prepared for you a delicious chocolate tasting in the MCR, and our fabulous Bar Manager, Rhienna, has prepared this as a good way to get to know our MCR Bar (for those who by then haven't yet explored it). Thursday 10th October, 16:00 and 20:00, respectively, meet in the MCR.
- Scavenger Hunt: Our social secretary, Thomas, will lead you around many of Oxford's historic buildings, exploring and discovering many fascinating pubs, inns, public houses, and many other places where you will be able to enjoy some form of liquid refreshment, as well as food, hopefully still an enjoyable expression of the English weather. Saturday 12th October, 15:00, meet in the MCR or join along the way. Locations will be updated on the WhatsApp group.

- **Choral Evensong:** Oriel Chapel is beautiful space that plays a central role in college life. We have a beautiful (and very competitive) choir which sing Choral Evensong, Sung Eucharist and Compline every week during term, in candle-light, and the services are attended by many of our members, as well as fellows, undergraduates and external visitors. It is a very special space, whether you share the Christian faith or not, to take a moment for reflection and peace. Rob, our chaplain, leads the services and puts together an interesting line-up of preachers for the different services. I encourage you to come to this initial service of the year and experience this on your own. **Sunday, 13th October, 18:00, Oriel College Chapel.**
- **First 'Formal Hall' and 'Second Desserts':** As you might be aware, formal hall plays a role in our community-building experience. Oriel is the college that offers the most formal dinners a week, Sunday through Friday. This is a great opportunity to meet new people and bring guests whilst immersing yourselves in one of our most characteristic experiences. Remember to have a look at the dress code guidelines on our website and please note that Wednesdays and Sundays the dress code is more formal than other days. After Formal we will be waiting for you with Second Desserts in the MCR to conclude Freshers' Week in a chill and convivial setting.
- **Graduate Freshers' Admission Ceremony:** One of the most symbolic moments of your welcome to Oriel, which is the only college to have such an event. You will be officially admitted to Oriel by the Provost at the University Church of St. Mary, where you will sign your name on the Provosts' Book, on top of the tomb of Adam the Brome, Oriel's principal benefactor, and will then become full members of the College. **Saturday 12th October. Meet the Dean of Degrees in Third Quad at 11:30, where you will be briefed and then process across the High to the University Church for a 11:45 ceremony.**
- 'Welcome Event for Black Students' (at University College): An opportunity for black students from these neighbouring colleges to meet other black students: Univ, Christ Church, Corpus, Merton, Oriel and Pembroke. The purpose of this event is to offer black students, who may be in a small minority in their own college, to find a quick and easy way at the start of their time in Oxford of meeting black students from other colleges. The event will be hosted by Baroness Valerie Amos, master of Univ, on Tuesday 15th October, between 17:00 and 18:30 in the Master's Lodgings at University College.
- College Advisers and Tutor for Graduates Drinks: This is a great opportunity mid-way through the term to meet with your College Advisor and catch up with them in a more relaxed setting, with drinks and nibbles, and share a bit more about your progress, projects and interests. You will receive an invitation for this event and will need to RSVP. Thursday 7th November, between 18:00 and 19:00 in the Hall.
- **University Matriculation Ceremony:** Students of the University must go through the matriculation ceremony, in which the Vice-Chancellor officially confers upon you the status of students of it, all in latin. If you cannot attend in person, you can so so *in absentia*. Please refer to https://www.ox.ac.uk/students/new/matriculation. **Saturday 19th October. More information will be sent through email closer to the date.**



4 Useful Tips & Links

- Mental Health/Safety: settling into a new city is an exciting process, especially when you start a new adventure, but it can also get very busy and stressful sometimes and you might find yourselves struggling to cope with some things. There are plenty of mental health resources to help you deal with emotions, difficulties or even if for whatever reason you don't feel safe, physically or psychologically. If ever you find yourself in need of help, we can recommend you try any of these resources:
 - College Deans: at Oriel we have two Junior Deans and two Welfare Deans, who have different roles, but are all more than happy to help and are here to help you navigate the general difficulties of Oxford but also to sort out specific issues you might be facing. They have 'Deans Hours' every week during term, which will be advised at the beginning of each term, or you can contact them directly at their emails (see above) to ask for a meeting.
 - Porters: porters of colleges, be it Oriel or any other, are there to help you at any time. The 'Green Button' Scheme: if ever you feel unsafe anywhere in Oxford, you can go to any College's Porters' Lodge and they will welcome you and take care of you until you are safe.
 - Nightline: they are a volunteer-based service that work 8pm 8am every night and are available on the phone number 01865 270270 (you can find this number on the back of your BodCard). They offer support over the phone as well as a Get Home Safe service—if you are nervous or uneasy walking home alone, you can give them a call and they'll chat to you all the way home.

- Samaritans: they offer a 24/7 suicide and crisis prevention service, on the phone or face-to-face. Their volunteers are especially trained to help you in times of crisis, or in case someone close to you is in such a situation and you need the tools to help them. You can Rach them day or night and free of charge at 116 123, or on through their website: https://www.samaritans.org/how-we-can-help/contact-samaritan/.
- MCR Rooms: The MCR rooms (main room and study room) are open to its members 24/7. In them you will find comfortable space to work or relax for a moment. There are always coffee, tea, biscuits, newspapers and sometimes some special treats. You can also bring a limited number of guests into the MCR, who will always be under your responsibility. After using any of the MCR facilities, cutlery, crockery, etc., **you must** leave everything clean and tidy, also, **none of these elements** can be taken outside the MCR room.
- **Booking into Hall:** To book your meals, as well as to see the menu and check your current Battels, visit: https://meals.oriel.ox.ac.uk/
- **Printing:** There are several printing stations around the Main, Island and Rectory Road Sites. You can print in any of them using your Oriel user or you BodCard and the print charges will be added to your Battels. In order to upload a document to the system, visit: https://print.oriel.ox.ac.uk
- **Battels & Financial Support:** 'Battels' are your termly bill from College, which can include rent, drinks, dining bills from Hall, MCR Membership fees, etc. You receive 4 of these per year: one at the start of each term and a final one at the end of Trinity term. The Graduate Officer is also in charge of, e.g., Graduate Studies Office forms and general administrative queries for graduates.
- **Settling-in and Living in Oxford:** We have a dedicated section of our MCR website with many tips and directions on how to get a lot of the stuff you will need when arriving (bikes, furniture, clothing, medicine, food, etc.), as well as recommendations for cafés, bookshops, gyms, sports, parks and other things of interest that might take you a while to find on you own.
